Purpose of Report	To seek Cabinet approval of the consultation document detailing the emerging Local Plan's planning policies.

	(c) that, subject to any amendments resolved by Cabinet, together with any amendments and/or updates approved under (b), the consultation document is made available for public comment, together with: (i) Sustainability Appraisal; and (ii) Habitat Regulations Assessment; for a period of at least six weeks, commencing during November 2015.

## **Background Information**

- 1. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) requires every local planning authority to produce a Local Plan that plans positively for the development and infrastructure required in its area. The emerging review of the Cotswold District Local Plan will set out policies and proposals aimed at meeting the challenges facing the area over the period 2011 2031. The plan's policies and proposals must be consistent with the requirements of the NPPF.
- 2. The Council has already consulted informally on the District-wide Development Strategy; site-specific housing and employment allocations; gypsy and traveller sites; and local green spaces. This report seeks Cabinet approval for the proposed content of the final, informal consultation document, detailed at **Appendix 'A'**, which has been enclosed as a separate document with this Agenda.

[Please note: In the document at Appendix A, 'Monitoring Indicators' appears as a heading at the end of each section, and there is a 'Monitoring Framework' section at the end of the document. Although these have yet to be populated with text, the final version of the Consultation document will include this monitoring information. The resulting text (which will not affect any policy wording), will be approved in accordance with Recommendation (b) of this report].

- 3. The proposed new policies are quite different from the saved policies of the current Local Plan. A key reason for this is that the Council needs to avoid repeating policy that exists at national level in the NPPF, or technical detail that is comprehensively addressed in Planning Practice Guidance (PPG). The Local Plan needs to be a document that addresses <u>local</u> issues. Once adopted, the policies will be used by the Council to assess planning applications alongside the NPPF.
- 4. The robustness of all aspects of the Local Plan is dependent on the availability of the latest evidence. The iterative nature of the plan preparation process means that, at the time of preparing papers for this Cabinet report, some evidence was awaited; hence, certain policies may require further amendments prior to publication. To take account of this possibility, Officers recommend that decisions on minor amendments to the policies proposed in Appendix A be delegated to the Portfolio Holder for Forward Planning.
- 5. The proposed planning policies are primarily intended to assist in the delivery of the Council's Local Plan Objectives. The Objectives have previously been made available for public comment in consultation documents, most recently in January 2015 (Development Strategy and Site Allocations). The Local Plan Objectives are not part of this consultation.
- 6. Representations that were submitted in respect of the January 2015 document, along with any that result from the forthcoming consultation, will be taken into account in producing a 'Pre-Submission' version of the Local Plan. This will be the whole Local Plan and it will be subject to statutory public consultation procedures in spring 2016 under Regulation 19 of the Town and Country Planning Regulations. Unlike consultation under Regulation 18, it will be a formal stage of plan preparation, which entails prescribed, statutory, procedures. Importantly, representations submitted under Regulation 19 will be restricted to comments relating to the 'soundness' of the draft Local Plan or to its compliance with legal requirements or processes. This is because the system is based on the assumption that the submitted plan is essentially sound; hence, the Inspector will focus on representations challenging its soundness when examining the Local Plan and the supporting evidence. The examination will be held in public and the Inspector may, at her or his discretion, invite people who have made representations to take part in discussions.
- 7. To reiterate, and for the avoidance of doubt, the forthcoming Local Plan Planning Policies consultation document does not address any representations that were made in relation to the public consultation undertaken earlier in 2015. Those representations will be taken into account when preparing the Pre-Submission Local Plan next year.
