- 1.1. Cotswold District Historic Environment Topic Paper 2014
- 1.1.1 To provide robust evidence for the production of the Reg. 18 stages of the Cotswold District Local Plan, an Historic Environment Topic Paper was produced in 2014. It included an initial set of strategy objectives.
- 1.1.2 The 2014 Historic Environment Topic Paper was the subject of informal consultation within the Council and with the following external partners:-
 - Historic England;
 - Cotswolds Conservation Board;
 - Campaign to Protect Rural England;
 - Gloucestershire County Council;
 - Natural England;
 - Diocese of Gloucestershire;
 - Gloucestershire Gardens and Landscape Trust.
- 1.1.3 It was also available on the Council's Website as part of the evidence base for the preparation of the Local Plan. No comments were received on the paper as part of that process.
- 1.2. <u>Conservation Areas (CA) in Cotswold District 2015 Boundary Reviews; CA Appraisals; CA Management Plans; Community Involvement; Other Issues</u>

In response to queries raised by several Parish Councils about the Council's actions regarding CAs, the review paper referred to above was produced in 2015. The paper was the subject of consultation with the Cabinet Member for Planning and Housing. It covers a range of CA tasks that the Council is, could or should be undertaking, looks at new ways of achieving the appropriate outcomes, and sets prioritises for that work.

1.3. The Emerging Local Plan

- 1.3.1 The Reg. 18 consultation drafts include a range of strategic and development management policies on the historic environment as well as an early version of a 'positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment', as required by paragraph 126 of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). This evolved from the 2014 topic paper.
- 1.3.2 Whilst representations on the Reg. 18 consultations were largely positive, Historic England has emphasised the need for more detail and certainty of delivery in a revised historic environment strategy. The Council and Historic England have a mutual duty to co-operate.
- 2. <u>Historic Environment Strategy 2016</u>
- 2.1 The 2014 topic paper has been expanded to incorporate the 2015 work on CAs, as well as to reflect progress on the Local Plan; changes to Historic England guidance; and to provide a stronger framework for the 'positive strategy' for the historic environment. It was considered that a more robust approach was required, particularly in the context of the Reg.19 stage of the Local Plan, and therefore formal approval of the Strategy is now sought a copy of the Strategy is attached at **Appendix 'A'**.
- 2.2 The 2016 Strategy provides clarity on the importance of the historic environment of the District and the ways in which the Council can conserve and enhance this important resource, in partnership with other relevant organisations and local communities.
- 2.3 The Strategy includes sections on:-
 - the positive strategy for the historic environment of the District;
 - · historic environment evidence base;
 - o legislation and guidance;
 - o heritage assets:
 - o summary of the historical development of the District;
 - o analyses of the historic environment;
 - o design guidance;
 - o heritage at risk;
 - o major heritage themes that contribute to local distinctiveness;
 - o drivers for change;
 - o consultation on local plan documents;
 - o Officer-led SWOT analysis;
 - current priorities.
- 2.4 It also incorporates an action plan, which highlights both on-going priorities, such as the consideration of historic environment issues within planning decisions, supporting local communities on relevant issues when preparing neighbourhood plans and ensuring that the heritage of the District is a key part of the attraction of the area for visitors, and new areas of work, such as piloting innovative ways of preparing CA appraisals and management plans and reviewing CA boundaries.
- 2.5 The implementation of this Strategy will be delivered mainly within existing budgets. However, the financial and staff resource implications of some actions will require further consideration, particularly after the CA pilot has been completed. It is possible in future that Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding could be directed at delivering aspects of the Strategy.
