Dear Sir

We are writing to express our strong support for the confirmation of the above mentioned Tree Preservation Order and believe these trees deserve protection for the following reasons:

Trees referenced G1 and G2 on the map

Due to the scale of these trees, they are of high visual amenity value to the north-west entrance to Fairford, lying immediately adjoining the edge of open countryside and thereby contributing to a soft transition to the built form in this part of Fairford and enhancing the character of the local landscape. We agree with the comments made by the Planning Inspector when refusing a previous planning application appeal (APP/F1610/W/25/3360024) at The Folly, that removal of these trees 'would be harmful to the character and appearance of the area' and 'any replacement landscaping would take considerable time to mature'.

Trees referenced G3 and T1 on the map

These fruit trees provide welcome habitats for wildlife due to the veteran features they exhibit; namely hollow trunks and rot holes. In addition the spring blossom is an essential high quality nectar source for the many bees, hoverflies, butterflies and other numerous insects which we regularly see in West End Gardens. The late hanging fruit provides a valuable food source for numerous birds seen in the vicinity. Having lived close to The Folly for almost 20 years we can also verify the existence of bats in West End Gardens and each year enjoy the sight of them foraging insects in and around the garden of The Folly and neighbouring gardens.

For the reason above we urge the Council to confirm this Tree Preservation Order.
